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2022 UCI ANTI-CANCER CHALLENGE RAISES RECORD-BREAKING \$1 MILLION FOR PROMISING CANCER RESEARCH

Funds support research at the UCI Health Chao Family Comprehensive Cancer Center and its pediatric cancer affiliate, CHOC.

IRVINE, CALIFORNIA – On Saturday, Oct. 8, more than 3,000 UCI Anti-Cancer Challenge participants, donors and supporters gathered at UCI Aldrich Park for the first time since 2019 to ride, run and walk for innovative cancer research.

Together, they helped raise \$1 million to fund promising cancer pilot projects and early phase clinical trials at the UCI Health Chao Family Comprehensive Cancer Center, the only NCI-designated comprehensive cancer center based in Orange County. Through a special partnership with CHOC, a portion of the funds will be dedicated to pediatric cancer research.

The record-breaking fundraiser greatly exceeded what the peer-to-peer campaign brought in last year. In the previous five years of the event, UCI Anti-Cancer Challenge participants had raised a total of \$2.6 million for the cause, and as a result of those funds, an additional \$21.9 million in extramural grants was rewarded to UCI investigators for their research.

“I am grateful for the overwhelming support we’ve received from our participants, donors and sponsors this year,” said Richard A. Van Etten, MD, PhD, UCI Health Chao Family Comprehensive Cancer Center director and UCI Anti-Cancer Challenge founder. “The support of our community and collaboration between over 200 UCI researchers working tirelessly to conduct promising cancer research propels us closer toward our goal of preventing, treating and curing all forms of the disease.”

UCI Anti-Cancer Challenge sponsors underwrite event costs, ensuring 100 percent of the funds raised by participants go directly toward the cause. This year’s sponsors included LA Fitness, Club Studio, Kay Family Foundation, Hensel Phelps, KTLA, Anaheim Ducks, Dunkin’, Standard Drywall, Enclos, GSK, Bristol Meyers Squibb and Helio Genomics.

Starting at 6 a.m., riders attended the event early to prepare for the 14-, 35-, 60- and 100-mile bike routes. Each group was welcomed by UCI leadership including Dr. Van Etten, Michael J. Stamos, M.D, dean of the UCI School of Medicine, and Chad Lefteris, CEO of UCI Health. At the start of the 5K and 10K run/walks, country recording artist Rick Monroe sang the national anthem and was joined by Chip Yost, KTLA reporter and bureau chief, who served as the 2022 UCI Anti-Cancer Challenge emcee for the opening ceremony.

The event also included a family-friendly festival hosted by UCI Health, where the UCI Stem Cell Clinic, Gavin Herbert Eye Institute, Susan Samueli Integrative Health Institute and Chao Family Comprehensive Digestive Disease Center connected with participants and shared about their services.

Following the activities, founder and owner of the Anaheim Hills Saddle Club, Dr. Andrew Edwards, was honored with UCI Health urologic cancer surgeon, Dr. Thomas Ahlering, during the awards ceremony for their dedication and support of cancer research. Ronit Benjamin, 2022 UCI Anti-Cancer Challenge

volunteer chair and top individual fundraiser, remarked, “Being involved in the UCI Anti-Cancer Challenge these last four years has truly been soul fulfilling for me. By honoring my father-in-law and grandparents, I’m helping others to live or have a better quality of life.
